Commission to Host Part II of Mental Health and Addiction Services Virtual Community Forum

(Rochester, New York) —The Commission on Racial and Structural Equity (RASE) will host a second virtual Zoom Community Forum on Mental and Addiction from 6:30 p.m. to 8:30 p.m., Monday, Nov. 16. The *Real Talk: Mental Health and Addiction Community Discussion Part II* seeks public input on better ways to serve community members with mental illness as well as substance use disorders.

"Mental health and addiction are a critical topic and conversation that is frequently unaddressed," said Commissioner Dr. Eric Caine. "There are numerous factors contributing to inadequate mental health and substance use care including inaccessibility of services, cultural stigma surrounding mental health and addiction, discrimination and others. We look forward to hearing from as many community member as possible to learn where people feel they are not being served equally or equitably."

The RASE Mental Health and Addiction working group aims to achieve better access to needed mental health and substance use disorders services when people have no access to the healthcare system. It hopes to re-examine and modify the interpretation of the Monroe County Department of Human Services (DHS) regulations and accelerate approval of harm reduction programming as an indicated intervention for DHS-approved treatment, among other policies and practices.
